INSTRUCTIONS FOR MOTHERS FOR STORAGE OF EXPRESSED BREAST MILK FOR THEIR BABIES IN NSCU

- 1. Wash your hands and fingernails with soap and water before assembling equipment to express your milk.
- 2. After each use wash you breast pump attachments that come in contact with milk with warm soapy water. Rinse thoroughly and dry.
- 3. Sterilize milk collection equipment daily by boiling the attachments in water for 15 to 20 minutes or using a microwave sterilizing bag or microwave sterilizers.
- 4. Store your expressed breast milk in plastic bottles given to you by your baby's nurse.
- 5. Write the date and time you expressed your milk on you baby's label given to you by your baby's nurse.
- 6. Refrigerate of freeze your expressed breast milk immediately after you express it (within 1 hour).
 - Store REFRIGERATED breast milk at 36°F to 42°F.

Refrigerated breast milk must be used within 48 hours of expressing. Unused portions must be discarded after 48 hours.

• Store **FROZEN** breast milk at minus 5°F to 5°F.

Frozen breast milk can be stored for up to 6 months if the freezer is kept at 0°celcius.

- 7. Store your expressed breast milk in the back of the refrigerator/freezer; it is the coldest part of the refrigerator/freezer.
- 8. Store your expressed breast milk in the refrigerator/freezer at home until you are ready to leave to bring it to the hospital.
- 9. Use oldest milk first.
- 10. Once frozen breast milk starts to defrost it cannot be refrozen.
 - Defrosted breast milk can be stored in the refrigerator for 24 hours. It must be discarded 24 hours after defrosting.
- 11. Bring only a daily supply of breast milk to the hospital each day.
 - Storage facilities at the hospital cannot accommodate more than a daily supply.
- 12. Transport your breast milk in an insulated bag with an ice pack to keep frozen breast milk frozen and refrigerated milk cold.
 - If you do not have and insulated bag to transport your breast milk and did not receive one from your baby's nurse ask you baby's nurse for an insulated bag.
- 13. When you bring milk to the hospital for your baby always check each bottle of milk with a nurse to make sure bottles are labeled properly.
 - Sign the Breast Milk Log with the nurse after you and the nurse check each bottle of breast milk.
- 14. If you are visiting during a feeding and your baby is being fed you expressed breast milk, check the label on the breast milk with your baby's nurse and sign the log with her.
